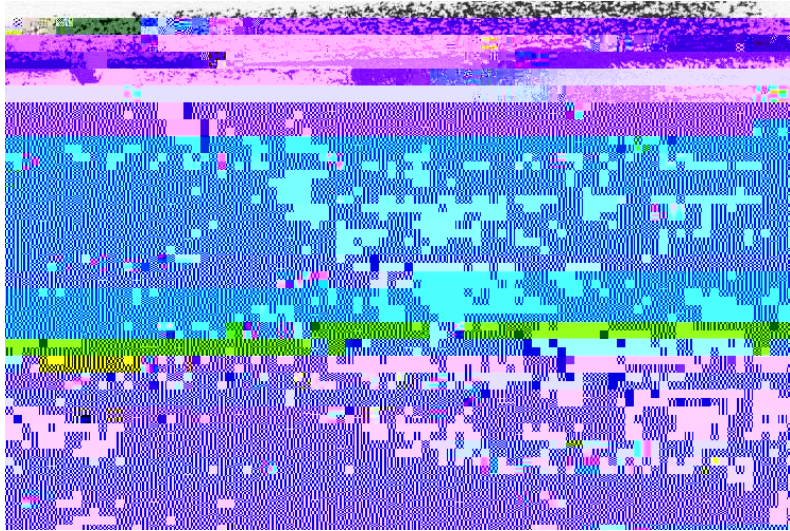

John Lane and the first steel plow

would not clear. In other words the soil would stick to the surface of the plow, and frequent stops would have to be made so it could be scraped off by a wooden paddle. A writer in the Prairie Farmer observed, "...a cast iron plow will no more clear itself in most of

set up a forge in Lockport. He made plows, carriages, and implements. In 1856 he operated something called the Lockport Steam Plow Factory. But it is probable that this didn't produce a large number of plows.

In 1850 John Lane Jr. produced 30 plows in his Lockport works. He, unlike his father, was to take out a number of patents on plows, the first in 1857. His most
